The three evenings (comprising two sessions) provide an introduction to associative economics, an approach that uses Rudolf Steiner's economic insights into the place of economics in human history and the deeper meaning of market forces, corporations and finance. Topics covered include economic history, the role of corporations, the for-profit/not-for-profit divide, taxation, monetary policy, accounting and modern finance.
